Meeting Convened by Secretaries Laura Fornash, Marla Decker and Dr. Bill Hazel

Secretary Decker opened the meeting, introduced her co-chairs, and welcomed members of the Taskforce. The Taskforce then introduced themselves.

Jennifer Aulgur, from Secretary of the Commonwealth's office, issued the oath of office to the Taskforce members.

James Schliessmann, Assistant Attorney General, FOIA officer, briefed the Taskforce on issues related to FOIA and provided them with information related to public bodies.

No questions regarding FOIA.

Secretary Decker began her discussion of the organization of the Taskforce. She thanked the public for being here, and thanked each Taskforce member for the work that they are agreeing to do. The Taskforce has an aggressive schedule.

The Taskforce is divided into three workgroups: education, mental health and public safety. Public input is welcome and encouraged. The Taskforce is providing opportunities for that to be done. This opportunity is provided through an on-line medium – there is a place on our various websites that references the School and Campus Safety Taskforce, and it provides a "click here" where you can provide your input. There will also be a public comment period at the end of the business portion of these meetings.

The Taskforce and Workgroups are not the place for larger policy discussions. This Taskforce will not address specific bills that have been introduced unless the General Assembly asks the Taskforce to do so.

Finally, the group must be realistic. The Taskforce will need to prioritize items requiring legislation first and stay within its means. It is important to keep in mind current budgetary constraints.

Finally, the purpose of the workgroup is to not be reactionary, but rather keep a reasonable and calculated approach, basing recommendations on analysis and evidence.

Secretary Decker welcomed the Governor and the Attorney General.

Opening and Charge of the Taskforce – Governor Robert F. McDonnell

The Governor thanked the team for its willingness to serve to get done the work of the Taskforce. He apologized for convening them on such short notice but due to the General Assembly session, he felt that time was of the essence. When the Governor introduced the budget amendments, he reserved some money until the interim report is made at the end of January, after the Taskforce preliminary recommendations come out. Governor Kaine and he worked closely together when he was AG and worked together to come up with some initial recommendation shortly after Virginia Tech. He asked the Taskforce to see if it can do some changes administratively or see if DCJS can administer in the area of changes in law enforcement standards. He knows the Taskforce members all share the common goal of making sure that every young child can graduate and can get there in a safe and secure environment.

Secretary Fornash thanked Secretary Decker for laying the groundwork for the public and the Taskforce. Regarding the Education Workgroup, meetings are scheduled for January 17 at 1:00 p.m., and January 24 at 10:00 a.m. The Education workgroup will be focused on looking at existing resources as they relate to crisis management and emergency response. It will look for gaps and opportunities for things for the Taskforce to work on.

Resources for School Safety; Briefing for the Governor's Taskforce

Dr. Cynthia Cave, Department of Education, gave a presentation on behalf of the Department.

Virginia Schools and Campus Safety: Snapshot of Current Data in Preparation for Future Changes

Donna Michaelis, Director of the Center for School Safety with the Department of Criminal Justice Services, gave a presentation on behalf of DCJS.

Secretary Decker asked if there were any questions from the Taskforce for Ms. Michaelis.

There were some questions regarding the interpretation of the data presented, and evaluation of trainings presented.

The Mental Health Perspective

James Stewart, Commissioner of the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services, presented on behalf of the Agency.

Secretary Hazel then introduced the individuals staffing the mental health workgroup.

He and Attorney General Cuccinelli will co-chair the Workgroup. Allison Tysinger, John Pezzoli and Megan McGuire will staff the Workgroup. The meetings are scheduled on Thursday, January 17 and Thursday, January 24 from 2:00 – 5:00 p.m.

Secretary Hazel invited questions of the Commissioner from the Taskforce members.

There was a discussion about use of effective programs, and innovative ways to reach out and provide innovative access to mental health services, like telemedicine.

For the next Taskforce meeting, the primary responsibility is to review the recommendations from the workgroups.

The Attorney General will make available counsel at each of the workgroups. Steve Witmer will be providing legal support to public safety workgroup; Noelle Shaw-Belle will be working with Education workgroup; Allison Tysinger will be working with mental health workgroup.

Public Comment

Mary Ann Bergeron with Virginia Association of CSBs offered that if there is anything needed on behalf of local CSBs, they'll be glad to facilitate.

The meeting was adjourned.
